Tractor	Anyone working or walking within area of operation. Includes Operators, Members and General Public Collision injuries, Crush Injuries	Machinery is currently being operated without a Club Policy having been agreed or a user's manual being produced	Suggest training manual is produced and Club Policy regarding operation is developed by Management Committee to be agreed by Main Committee	Ships Husband D. Wilkinson	Before launching season 2018	
Boat Travel Hoist	Anyone working or walking within area of operation. Includes Operators, Members and General Public Collision injuries, Crush Injuries	Machinery is currently being operated without a clear user's manual and Club policy being produced	See above	Ship's Husband D. Wilkinson	As above	
Electric/Extension Cables	Anyone walking in the area is at risk of tripping, electrocution from bared wires and plugs/sockets that may have shorted or tripped.	The power supply is switched off overnight but owners working on their boats or wishing to use heaters, de-humidifiers, power tools and lighting simply can access the power without difficulty	A qualified electrician should carry out annual tests on all external club power systems, disable any that are faulty and produce a report for the chair of the Clubhouse committee Ships Husband to check that power supplies are disconnected each evening	Clubhouse Committee chair/ships Husband	Immediately and ongoing Records to be filed and should be made available for Inspection
